

HC REFORM TO SUCCEED



153 Non-probability sample of medical professionals - telephonic 50:50 public and private

2600 self-selected sample via online survey

> 212 non-probability sample. Excluding medical professionals telephonic and personal



SNAPSHOT OF SURVEY DONE BY PPS IN MID-2019

Combination of qualitative and quantitative methods

Variety of answers contextualises personal preference and illustrate differences of opinion, often contradictions and opportunities for further engagement

Telephonic interviews with medical and general professionals largely split into positive or negative towards NHI (30% each) or uncertain (40%)

Conducted in consultation with School of Economic & Business Sciences, University of Witwatersrand

- Claims SLA for service providers
- Dual system NHI plus

SUPPLY OF SERVICES

- Referral pathways affect supply & demand (choice)
- Conditions of work & professional integrity
- Emigration is always a realistic option for the qualified

MANAGEMENT OF HR & SYSTEMS

- Sufficient resourcing across the disciplines and country
- Governance & structures for checks-andbalances
- Competitive remuneration
- Corruption

ADMINISTRATION & IT


- Use & build on existing systems & best practice









































CHALLENGES WITHIN THE HEALTH SYSTEM

There are challenges in both the public and private sectors.

- Public sector challenges
- Private sector challenge

Significant efforts have been made to improve the quality of healthcare delivery in South Africa, but there are still huge discrepancies between this fragmented 2-tiered system.

Requires an inclusive and collaborative approach





PPSHA POSITION ON THE NHI PROPOSALS

The lack of an accompanying paper from National Treasury on the fiscal implications as well as the associated Money Bill is a cause of concern as there is no full understanding of how the NHI will be funded.

I will focus specifically on the following:

- Governance
- Role of Medical schemes
- HMI Recommendations





CONCERNS OF THE NHI BILL - GOVERNANCE







Clarity is needed on how delegation of authority will be handled to prevent abuse.





Limitation of power in critical roles





Concern about corruption at all levels of the healthcare value chain.









CONCERNS OF THE NHI BILL - ROLE OF MEDICAL SCHEMES



Clause 33 of the NHI Bill. This is a significant change from the 2018 version of the Bill



Limitation of citizens to purchase private healthcare, will be globally unprecedented and open to constitutional challenge.



Most developing countries with universal health cover allow for a dual system where citizens can pay taxes towards healthcare and then opt to pay for private healthcare should they wish.







CONCERNS OF THE NHI BILL

- HEALTH MARKET INQUIRY RECOMMENDATIONS



Proposed operational reforms have the potential to enhance efficiencies with immediate benefits in healthcare funding and delivery.



HMI recommendations are not in opposition to realisation of the ambitions of the NHI Fund. Can build a range of institutional and individual capacities to manage healthcare provision in South Africa.



Sustainability and affordability addressing inefficiencies and market failures.



Aim to ready the private sector to operate as part of NHI enabling the private sector to integrate into the NHI system.





PPSHA RECOMMENDATIONS / CONCLUSION

We support Healthcare reform

- Need for clarity on the timeframe of the initial phase, measures
 of success, what is in scope and what is out of scope in the
 initial phases, and what is included in the benefit package.
- Consistent use of terminology throughout the Bill with clear definitions – potential conflict between NHI Bill and National Health Act.
- Review of governance structures including focus on corruption , fraud etc.
- Review of the role of medical schemes (clause 33); with implementation of the HMI recommendations.
